Isaac "Dick" Swartz Family

The family of Isaac "Dick" Swartz appear in Leadville's city directory during a single year; 1892. In addition, Nathan and his parents appeared in several Leadville newspapers during that year, one of which links them to the larger Leadville Jewish community. Isaac's wife Hannah was born in Kentucky and her father, Michael Goldsmith is buried in a Jewish cemetery in that state. Her father was an immigrant from Saxony, while her mother originated in Bavaria. Given their age and origin, they were probably forced from the German states in the face of anti-Jewish laws which gained more

and more traction in the middle 19th century. ⁵ The origin of her parents, the timing of their immigration, as well as the location of the family burial plot suggest that Hannah was brought up in an American Reform German-Jewish community. While Hannah was an American from German parents, Isaac was interchangeably listed a Polish or Russian immigrant in census documents.

Due to the commonness of the Swartz name and to incomplete records, Isaac and his family are difficult to trace before and after their time in Leadville.

The 1885 Colorado state census listed the Isaacs as residents of Arapahoe county in 1885 which lends evidence to the probable makeup of the family during their time in Leadville 7 years later.⁶

In 1892, "Dick" was listed in Leadville's city directory as a produce salesman with a residence and business at 118 East 3rd Street.⁷ The building at 118 East 3rd in which they were listed as residents was a two story wood frame structure (left and above) with a storefront on the street level for the produce market and residential space on the second floor for the family. In June of 1892, both "Mr. and Mrs. D. Swartz" were listed as attendees of the annual Hebrew Ladies Society Strawberry Ice Cream Festival.⁸ One month later, 16 year old son Nathan was involved in a fight with a 15 year-old messenger named Hollingshead in the alley behind the Western Union Telegraph office, close to the Swartz household. During the melee, Hollingshead drew a pocket-knife and cut Nathan's arm from his shoulder to his bicep, inflicting a "ghastly wound". Dr. Heimberger was called to stich the wound, and no further mention of the incident was reported. According to the reporter, the assailant disappeared as press time. ⁹ While the attack on Nathan was not reported upon again, further evidence revealed that Hollingshead became a notorious "tough". Several years later in 1894, Hollingshead drunkenly attacked a city alderman in his shed and was sent to iail.¹⁰



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In August, Dick published an eye-catching advertisement in the *Herald Democrat* which touted his exclusive "carload" of fruit and vegetables from California under the sensational headline, "BIG WAR". ¹¹ Leadville's city directory from 1893 is not extant, and Dick did not appear in the 1894 Leadville city directory.

One article curiously revealed Nathan's presence in Leadville outside of 1892. In late May of 1896, a short notice in the City Council columns of the *Herald Democrat* announced that Nathan Swartz requested from jail that his fruit peddling fee could be waived, as he was incarcerated. It was reported that this request was rejected. While it is difficult to determine if this is the same Nathan Swartz of this study without an address or further documentation, the profession and name make the connection very likely. The report stated that Nathan was arrested for theft. Further details of the situation were not uncovered and neither Nathan nor Dick appeared in the 1895 or 1897 Leadville city directories; the 1896 directory does not exist.

However, it can be proven with certainty that Nathan was out of jail by 1900 and that the family relocated to Cripple Creek to continue in the produce business. Jenny was not listed in the household because she married Harry Levy and was a resident of Omaha, Nebraska. The 1900 census was enumerated with several family members short from the list enumerated by the often inaccurate 1885 Colorado State census. Following the census of 1900, the family dispersed across the nation. Nathan was not traceable in records by this author. Jennie was laid to rest in a non-denominational cemetery outside of Spokane, Washington while youngest daughter Mabel is buried with her Christian husband in California.
